1. We seek happiness; yet often find to be elusive. Searching for happiness is like looking for glasses while you are wearing them. No wonder you cannot find happiness because it is not outside but INSIDE you.
2. Every infant lives in a natural state of happiness. They are in awe of the world and experience joy with each discovery and accomplishment. However, as they grow, they are subjected to an endless barrage of criticism from those around them. As a result, their psyche becomes filled with negative thoughts that prevent them from experiencing happiness.
3. Happiness does not depend on gaining possessions but on **RELEASING** the negativity that clogs our mind. When this is done, we will be free to re-experience our natural state of happiness. It is not what we have, but what we are; not what we possess, but what we enjoy.

4. How do you get rid of the garbage in your mind? Take vitamins for the mind. That is, read good books. The psychology and self-help sections of your nearest library and bookstore have many excellent titles to choose from.
5. Some people believe that they will be happy when they graduate; when they get a job; when they get promoted; when they retire and so on. Happiness, to them, is always an elusive goal that is expected to arrive sometime in the future. But happiness is not contingent on things or events; it is not a destination but a stage of being. It is not meant to be experienced in the future but at this very moment, NOW. Our past is dead and our future is unborn. The only time we live is now. So, the place to be happy is here; the time to be happy is now and the way to be happy is to make others happy.
6. We must learn to surrender to the flow of events, to accept what cannot be changed. Did someone cut you off on the highway? Someone always will. But why get upset? Anger just festers in your system and like an acid, eats away at your happiness.
7. Happiness to man is what purring is to a cat. It is the feeling of contentment. It is the joy of being alive. Fish cannot see the water they live in. But if we remain aware, we can experience the ocean of joy we live in. It is in the chirp of the cricket, the rustle of autumn leaves, the wind on our face, the fragrance of dew, the glitter of a dragon flies wing, the warmth of a spring day. It is also the taste of our favourite meal, the sound of laughter, smiling faces, triumphant music and a fiery sunset. Be aware. Look, listen, taste, feel and smell. There are lots to enjoy and be happy about. A wise man once said "I asked God for all things, so I might enjoy life but God give me life, so I might enjoy all things."

9. "We find greatest joy," R. J. Baughan wrote, "not in getting but in expressing what we are.
